Daramalan in 2006

Daramalan today is a modern teaching institution with over 1460 co-educational students across Years 7 to 12.

The numbers are fairly well spread 50/50 across boys and girls with a slight skew towards boys but not enough to attract calls of bias.

The College years (Years 11 & 12, or Forms 5 & 6 as they were previously) are within the total School, but as always, operate with more independence than the High School. Freedom, along with the responsibility that goes with that privilege, is given to the College students to get them used to what will be expected from them when it comes time for them to go onto further studies or into the workforce.



The School today comprises some ten major buildings as you can see from the accompanying aerial photograph below and page 4. The new Fulton Administration block facing the front car park (above) is the newest addition and was opened two years ago. It also houses the library and a state-of-the-art computer resource centre. Our next project is a new College Chapel. More on that later.

There are over 150 staff today teaching a wide range of subjects and courses and these days are all lay staff. The last MSC teacher finished some years ago, which is a little sad, but unfortunately, a worldwide trend. Our long-term rival "St Eddies" in Griffith is also in the same boat. However, we are lucky at Daramalan in having a strong MSC presence across many levels of the College with the day to day involvement Fr Jim Littleton as Assistant to the Principal – MSC Mission, along with Br Barry Smith as Business Manager, Br Dave Merrick and Fr Harold Baker who look after the Residence, and Br John Walker who works as a nurse at Calvary Hospital in Canberra. Last month Br Paul Brooks also joined the MSC community.

Sadly, two prominent figures in the early days of Daramalan, Father John McCowage and Father Anthony Prentice passed away in 2003 and 2005 respectively.



The new Daramalan Chapel




Plans are well underway with the design of a purposebuilt Daramalan chapel.

Previously the only places for worship within the school were temporary locations that were never meant to offer a permanent place of solitude and reflection. The College was crying out for a proper chapel to serve not only the school's religious needs, but also a suitable venue for the wider community who wanted to forge links with the school by using our chapel for private weddings, funerals, baptisms and so forth. The new plans will cater for all these wants and needs and will be open to all who wish to make use of it.

The necessary funds to commence this project have still to be found and several incomegenerating initiatives are currently under consideration. However, at the moment, we are some way from our target and would encourage all ex-students to consider supporting
